#### **Community of Learning**

As you may be aware Gore High School is part of a community of learning, along with 12 other schools. The lead Principal is Annie Nelson from St. Mary's school. An achievement challenge has been drafted up and submitted to the Secretary for Education. We are awaiting a response. In the meantime, the CoL has formed four working groups to help us deliver on the vision. These are:

- Vision for the Eastern Southland learner success
- Well-being and achievement
- Processes and strategies, with a focus on transitions
- Communication and coherence

The Community of Learning is also heavily involved in the Hokonui Highway initiative. This concept is about all of the service providers in the Gore District coming together to provide the infrastructure needed to look after children from birth right through to future employment.

The Highway analogy evokes visions of: different lanes for different pathways; signage to help with preparation and positioning; on ramps and off ramps where one can join or leave; roundabouts where choices can lead us to next stages; highway patrol to protect us and others when we have lost the plot; and rest stops where we can rejuvenate and get assistance if required. All these things help us to navigate the journey. For the highway to function smoothly, it must be part of a co-ordinated system, and those with different responsibilities must work together, for the sole purpose of ensuring that each traveller reaches their destination safely and comfortably. Providing a well-functioning Highway for our children is the work of the Hokonui Highway initiative. It is obvious that schools need to be a key part of this.

We have a busy weekend ahead, not just with school sport, but also with the GHS Foundation Art, Food and Wine Fundraiser and the School Ball. If you have senior students in your household, you will no doubt have heard plenty about the School Ball. Very likely, you will know more about it than I do!! #### **YEAR 10 SCIENCE**

This week, Year 10 Science students went back to the Hokonui Rūnanga to test the water in their wetland area. The students used their science skills for testing phosphate and nitrate levels, dissolved oxygen, pH and temperature. Libby, Ashleigh and Sam were in charge of identifying and counting invertebrates and had the good luck to scoop out a 120mm Koura. Sam and John perfected their bucket throwing skills, in order to scoop up water samples from the ponds surface. Caleb, Elijah and Oliver were in charge of chemical testing and using the clarity tube to see how clear the water is, while Marcus and Anthony tested the water for total dissolved solids and temperature.






#### **GO KIWI GO**

#### **YEAR 9 SCIENCE**

Year 9s have been learning about States of Matter, including evaporation and condensing. In order to see where these are used in real life, we took a field trip to the Hokonui Moonshine Museum. They learned about the history of

moonshine in Gore and the length the McRae's went to make and sell their moonshine. We looked at the equipment they used and compared it with modern equipment back in the lab at school.





#### **YEAR 13 BIOLOGY**

Biology students have been learning the skills needed to be an early human, making stone tools from stones, wood and flax. In the Human Evolution Topic, students learn to link the ability to make and use tools with the anatomical features of early human species such as Archaic *Homo sapiens* and *Homo* n*eanderthalensis*. In summary, its a good job our Year 13's do not have to make tools and hunt their own food!







#### YEAR 13 BIOLOGY FIELD TRIP TO DUNEDIN

This week the Year 13s went to Dunedin to help develop their science skills, from investigation to science communication. First stop was the University of Otago Biochemistry Department, where they tested their own blood for glucose and lactate levels before and after eating and exercise. This showed them the remarkable way that the body can maintain an internal balance as they go about their active lives. Next stop was the Otago Museum, for a session on Human Evolution, followed by some much needed pizza. In the evening, the students took turns to be science communicators, explaining to each other the concepts behind the various activities in the Tūhura science centre. Accommodation was amongst the exhibits in the Science centre.

The following day we went to Portobello to try out hands on activities to study the behaviour and responses of sea animals, watching crabs, snails and parasites as they go about their lives.
