Congratulations to our Scholarship recipients in each of the year groups, as well as all students who have been recognised on the Excellence boards for their dedication and hard work throughout the year.


Thanks to John McKinlay and the whole school team for your ongoing support of the GHS Foundation.

## From the Rectors Desk

Dear Ex-Pupils and Members of the Gore High School Foundation Nga mihi nui kia koutou katoa.

Another busy year at Gore High School is just about to end, and once again there have been lots of highlights.



In the sports arena our 1<sup>st</sup> XV had a very successful season, winning the Southland U18 Competition and the Otago/Southland Co-Ed schools' cup. They played Rangiora High School for the South Island honours, coming second on that occasion. The U15 Tournament team came 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 23 teams at the South Island Tournament played in Queenstown. It was a pleasure to watch them in the final as they bravely took on St. Andrews. Our A Grade Boys Basketball team took out the Eastern Southland Men's A Grade Competition! They had help from a couple of 'oldies' – Peter Howes and Mr Hadfield. Four of our students formed a rowing team this year and competed successfully at the Maadi Cup. On an individual level, Andrew Allan

once again took out first place in the triple jump at the New Zealand Secondary School Championships, and many of our students won representative honours throughout the year.

The PVC (Prefect's Variety Concert) continues to thrive and a couple of years ago we added the JVC (Junior Variety Concert) as well. This showcases our Y9 and 10 performers, and gives them a pathway to make it through to the PVC as well. The Prefects continue to do a very thorough and competent job of organising the PVC, and this year was no exception.

At Easter we welcomed the class of '59-'61 who held their re-union in Gore. It was a very worthwhile event. Thanks to John Speden for spearheading the organisation. I was able to spend some time with them here at the school, and enjoyed their re-union dinner held at the Gore RSA. When I left they were just starting a bit of a 'knees up' with Carswell Stevenson at the piano.

Staffing shortages continue to bite and in spite of welcoming six permanent new teachers this year, we are still going into the Christmas holidays with one position unfilled for 2019. During the year, two of our current staff, John Grogan and Simon Thomas gained well-earned promotions (unfortunately to other schools) and Vicki Hanna left to teach overseas.

A few days ago Keith Hanna brought to an end his 41 year tenure here; something of a record I would expect. Keith came here in 1978, and Gore High School has been the only school he has taught at throughout his entire career. Many of you will remember him. He has held multiple roles in the school but will primarily be remembered as Head of Social Sciences. Keith has a real passion for Geography, and this was recognised in 2003 when he was awarded a Woolf Fisher Fellowship for excellence in teaching. He will also be remembered as a man of integrity. We wish him well in his retirement

In 2019 all of our Year 9 students will be required to have their own laptop computer. How things change! I know that many of you will remember the days when there was no such thing as even an electronic calculator; slide rules and log tables were the norm. BYOD (Bring your own device) is not about the computer, but it is about accessing different ways of learning. We have been



preparing for this over the last two years, by running pilot classes in Year 9 and 10. Laptops are widely used in the Senior School of course, but this is mainly for information retrieval and presentation. In the Junior School we are wanting to enhance different ways of learning, like: better collaboration; multimodal ways of communicating; using real data for problem solving; critical thinking and so on. I fell that staff are well placed to take on this challenge.

Occasionally we get visits from ex-pupils and we welcome these opportunities to connect with our

students from the past. One such occasion was our recent Annual Prizegiving where Dr Lindsay Moffat came down from Auckland to attend. It was seventy years ago, in 1948, when he received the E C Smith Bursary. It was an honour to have him with us, and for him to meet the 2018 winner of the same scholarship, Mark Gardyne.

Many thanks to the members of the Gore High School Foundation for their support and their continued interest in our school. Best wishes to you all for 2019.
