PREPARING FOR MY FUTURE

A few weeks ago now, our Careers Advisor (Mrs McDonald) and our Year 13 Dean (Mrs Cooper) launched a 'Preparing for My Future' initiative with our Year 13 students. They have based this work around the Employability Skills (2017), and have prepared a resource portfolio aimed at assisting our Y13 students to gather supporting evidence in each of the seven categories below:

- Positive Attitude
- Team Work
- Communication
- Willingness to Learn
- Self-Management
- Thinking Skills
- Resilience

When students graduate at the end of this year, after five years at Gore High School, we want them to be well aware of the skills, characteristics and attributes that they take with them as they transition to further training or employment.

From an external point of view, this means that the people and organisations who take on GHS graduates will have confidence in what they are getting. From an internal locus though, it will mean each individual student will have an appreciation of their own maturity and development, and a confidence in themselves based on accurate self-reflection.

Leah submitted an entry into the awards for the first time this year and was runner up with her entry in the Secondary Schools Sustainability section. Inspiration for her designed garment began at home on the farm while looking for materials with a difference that could be used. The farm truck and her father's overalls provided Leah with the materials which she used to good effect. A seat belt, high vis vest, strop, seat cover and old and new overalls were just some of those materials that were used in a unique design that impressed the judges. The way these materials were put together and the design of the garment created a unique outcome, that one of the judges commented was well thought through and had an obvious theme. This while taking many photos as the model walked down the catwalk. This accomplishment follows Leah's success last year when she gained a 3rd placing in the National HETTANZ craft awards with a recycled Denim bag after gaining the craft Excellence award at the HETTANZ Make and Model. These being an indication of what can be created with sustainable, recyclable materials. Both these awards had large entries from schools throughout the country. 
1st XV FINAL AGAINST SOUTHLAND BOYS HIGH SCHOOL 2ND XV


This year during tournament week we are taking a side up to compete in a South Island tournament in Ashburton. This will be a great experience for our players.

GATEWAY APPLICATIONS

Hokonui Tertiary High School, Murihiku Trades Academy

The Murihiku Trades Academy and Hokonui Tertiary High School Level 2 NCEA courses will help you get ready for higher level study, an apprenticeship or a job.

- You will achieve credits towards NCEA
- You will do real, practical work-based learning in a tertiary environment with students from other schools
- You will study one day a week on Friday at SIT and go to school as normal for the rest of the week
- You will get an idea of the career you want to follow.

How to apply?

Grab a **green** Gateway/Hokonui Tertiary High School application form from student reception, complete it and hand it back to students reception. The Gore High School Careers Department will then contact for an interview in Term 4. This interview between the students, caregivers/parents and the Careers Department will provide a pathway forward for 2019.



NOTICE TO PARENTS OF ALL YEAR 11, 12 AND 13 STUDENTS

NCEA fees for 2018 have now been charged to accounts for all Year 11, 12 and 13 students. A Summary of Standards, together with a Statement of Account has been posted to all parents. All students should check the Summary of Standards to make sure the information is correct.

As noted on the Summary, fees must be paid no later than Friday, 31st August 2018. The amount is \$76.70 per student. Any students sitting Scholarship exams will also need to pay an additional \$30 per Scholarship subject.

If you hold a current Community Services Card, you are eligible for Financial Assistance which will reduce the cost of the NCEA fees to \$20 per student or \$30 per family. Please see Mrs Barclay in the school office to fill in the required form. You will need to present your Community Services Card as verification.

If these fees are not paid by the due date, payment will then need to be made directly to NZ Qualifications Authority. In this case, a late payment fee of \$50 will also be added. Non-payment of the fee will result in credits/exam results not being available on the student's Record of Achievement until such payment is made.
