### From the Rector's Desk

### **Keep Battling On**

A very warm welcome back to Term 3, which I usually view as the 'Keep Battling On' (KBO) phase of the school year. This is a time to remind ourselves of our aims for the year and to maintain daily progress towards those: many little steps make one longer journey.

### **ERO visit**

Early last term, we had a visit from the Education Review Office (ERO). We found the visit very positive and useful, and were delighted with the following findings:

- "There is a well considered approach to transitioning students and families into the school at Year 9."
- "Students are encouraged to take more responsibility for, and to make more decisions about the direction of their learning."
- "Strategic planning provides a clear direction for school improvement."
- "Ongoing review and development has made the curriculum more responsible to a diverse range of students' strengths, needs, and interests."
- "There is a positive tone and climate in this school. It is welcoming and inclusive."
- "Respectful and considerate relationships are clearly evident."
- "Classrooms visited by the Education Review Office were calm, with purposeful teaching evident. Students observed were well engaged in their learning."
- "School values are explicit and well understood."
- "A sustained focus on promoting student wellbeing continues to be a high priority."
- "Students with significant needs are well catered for within the Learning Hub that includes a range of special needs facilities."
- "The school has a strong sense of its place in the community and seeks to engage strongly with all stakeholders."
- "Trustees are knowledgeable, well informed by the Principal and work in close partnership with senior leaders to improve outcomes for students."
- "Trustees bring a range of strengths to fulfil their roles and responsibilities."

We also discussed with them some directions for development, and these were:

- Strengthening targeted action to accelerate progress for students who need it the most.
- Consideration should be given to developing a strategic direction for the success of Maori as Maori and this should be done in consultation with whanau.

- Strengthening the evidence based evaluation of the impact of planned actions on improving achievement and
- With regard to Appraisal, promoting deeper reflection and a collaborative approach to improving outcomes.

### **Strategic Review**

The Board of Trustees have begun a Strategic Review in order to reaffirm our overall 'Mission' and to set new Strategic Goals for the next 3-5 years. This was last carried out in 2012.

So far, a small group of the Board of Trustees, parents, students and staff have been involved. Over the next few weeks, consultation will widen.

When a draft is available, it will be made public to all of our community for comment before finally going to the full Board of Trustees for approval.

Board members, Brendon Harrex and Tracey Watson (Board of Trustees Chairperson) are leading this work, so feel free to contact them, or myself, if you have any thoughts about this process.

In the meantime, thank you for your continued support of the school. The level of community commitment to Gore High School was noted by ERO.

### Year 12 ORC



# NOTICE TO PARENTS OF ALL YEAR 11, 12 AND 13 STUDENTS NCEA FEES

NCEA fees for 2017 have now been charged to accounts for all Year 11, 12 and 13 students. A Summary of Standards, together with a Statement of Account has been posted to all parents. All students should check the Summary of Standards to make sure the information is correct.

As noted on the Summary, fees must be paid no later than Friday, 25<sup>th</sup> August 2017. The amount is \$76.70 per student. Any students sitting Scholarship exams will also need to pay an additional \$30 per Scholarship subject.

If you hold a current Community Services Card, you are eligible for Financial Assistance which will reduce the cost of the NCEA fees to \$20 per student or \$30 per family. Please see Mrs Barclay in the school office to fill in the required form. You will need to present your Community Services Card as verification.

If these fees are not paid by the due date, payment will then need to be made directly to NZ Qualifications Authority. A late payment fee of \$50 will also be added.

Non-payment of the fee will result in credits/exam results not being available on the student's Record of Achievement until such payment is made.


### **School Team and Group Photos**

### **Defence Force visit**

Flight Sergeant Bob Willis spoke to Year 11 students about the New Zealand Defence Force. He explained the various roles of the Army, Navy and Airforce which include humanitarian and disaster relief, peacekeeping and UN operations and civil aide to the New Zealand Police, Customs, Fire Service and the New Zealand Antarctic Programme.

To join the New Zealand Defence Force there are minimum requirements but Flight Sergeant Bob Willis stressed to students that they need to be

competitive to gain entry into the Defence Force. There are currently 35 different trades in the Army. The Defence Force is actively encouraging men and women to consider this career.
