SPANZ Principals' Conference

Earlier this week I attended the annual Secondary Principals' Conference. There were several very good presenters and I came home with lots of ideas. On Wednesday morning we were addressed by the Associate Minister of Education, Tracey Martin. She spoke about a variety of topics and there was a generous amount of time for Questions and Answers as well.



I thought it would be worthwhile to report on some of these:

30 Year Vision for Education

- The Government are about to begin consultation on the future direction of Education in New Zealand. Their aim is to produce a strategic plan aimed to enact a 30 year vision of Education, and they want this plan to remain largely unchanged by any future changes of Government.
- Consultation begins next month in Christchurch and in Auckland and they expect 500 800 participants at each two
 day event.
- These two large events will be followed by many smaller meetings and opportunities for people to contribute.
- They want to listen to the voices of people from all parts of society; this is not just a forum for education professionals.
- They want participants to think about what Education should be like in thirty years' time, and not focus too much on what education is like today.

If any parents or students get an opportunity to take part in this consultation then I would warmly encourage you to do so.

Learning Support and Behaviour Support

- The Government's aim is "That every child will have their individual needs assessed and addressed so that they can be the best that they can be."
- The Minister feels that the current response to Learning Support and to Behaviour Support has been inadequate. She also stated that in the past there has been a push for mainstreaming at all costs, but that is not the position that the current Government holds.

Communities of Learning

The Minister was asked where the Government stands with the Communities of Learning. She explained that at the moment the Communities of Learning were in a holding pattern. The Government is monitoring them and watching what is happening.

Teacher Shortages

- The Minister raised this issue herself. She feels that Minister Hipkins has done as much as he can as fast as he can.
- She stated that young people feel that the workload for pay is not good, and this stops many from joining the profession.
- The Minister stated that she wants the Ministry of Education and teachers to work as a team, and that she feels that picking on teachers does not help, as it lowers the status of the teaching profession, and that this is another reason why young people do not want to join.
- Another speaker, Professor Graeme Aitken, from Auckland University also spoke about teacher shortages. He used the supply of Physics teachers as an example, stating that between 2010 and 2017 Auckland University trained an average of 240 Secondary Teachers each year; but that just 5 of these were Physics teachers. Prior to this it used to be 10 12 Physics teachers per year. (Auckland University is New Zealand's largest trainer of teachers.)

WATER TESTING WITH YEAR 10 SCIENCE

This week the Year 10's have been out to the Hokonui Rūnanga, investigating water conditions in the wetland. This is to help the Rūnanga monitor the freshwater crayfish they introduced to the pond last year. Each session was an hour long, and involved a walk around the pond to identify the testing sites. The next step was to use the equipment accurately and gather data relating to the quality of the water. We will be taking groups of students out throughout the year, to gather continuous data on the water at the site.


